# **CHAIRMAN'S CHAT**

Since the last Epistle we have promoted two more events - at Judy Woods YHOA Super League and a YHOA Urban League using the already mapped area of Elland. Both events had encouraging comments from the competitors who enjoyed the sunny day at Judy Woods and ran fast enough at Elland to not notice the nithering arctic wind.

Rod made good use of Judy Woods (formerly Royds Hall) to produce some challenging courses in spite of the small area.

Neil produced some very tricky courses in Elland reflecting his experience of Urban orienteering.

We also had a fairly successful Compass Sport Trophy where West Anglia OC beat us by a mere 2 pts. There were some good runs by members including Luke Barraclough who counted with 100 points. The Yellow course was not included in the CST but was won by Francis Stuart.

Rod had given the clubs views to the discussion about extending the age groups so now we have a W70/M80 category so the older members can play a bigger part in the event and that worked well.

Congratulations to Emma & Laura for selection and competing in the Interland competition held on the Belgian border on 10 March 2019. They were not the only mother & daughter as ex-EPOC members Amanda and Alex Crawshaw also competed at Interland. It fascinates me that whole families can compete in orienteering. How lucky they are that there are such opportunities now.

#### **Future events**

The next activity for EPOC as a club will be helping at the BOC Relays in Middleton Woods on 6<sup>th</sup> May. Helpers have not yet been allocated apart from Richard Payne's group who are involved with the courses in the wood. The rest of EPOC's responsibility will be for the Start, Changeover and Finish arena based at the stadium on the North side of Middleton Woods.

On 20 July we are promoting a 2 part urban sprint based in Mytholmroyd. 2 parts means competitors can cross the road at their leisure to the 2<sup>nd</sup> part so no one gets run over.

The next day 21 July there will be a YHOA Urban event at Hebden Bridge.

Both these events need help in putting out controls, as Jonathon who is planning Mytholmroyd will be away on the day!

Race the Castles seems to be actually happening but we do not have a date apart from the week prior to the White Rose. Whilst the committee thought that Thornes Park would be a suitable venue we considered it might be a waste of a good area for a future sprint event. However, if we have a good entry that would be financially good and if we have a very poor entry that would be good as well as we can run a Sprint there on a different day due to not many competitors having been before.

East Pennine Orienteering Club Summary of Committee Meeting Wednesday 20 March 2019 at 7.30pm Marsh Liberal Club



- 1. Present: Jean Lochhead, Jackie Page, Emma Harrison, Neil Croasdell, David Morgan Apologies: Rod Shaw
- 2. Minutes of last Meeting: These were approved proposed EH, Seconded JP
- **3. Matters Arising**: Funding for junior members selected to represent in Internationals. Congratulations to Laura and Emma re Interland. England were winners. The event scheduled for 6/10/19 has been cancelled due to clash with Euro City Race which would take all key officials. JL reported that she should have sufficient helpers for BRC 19. The Thornes Park POC map still needs finalisation. There had been very little interest in Giraffes. DM suggested that the club could fund the purchase of say 25 at £6 for resale.
- 4. Chairman's Report: JL commented on a suggested funding application suggested by Peter Brooke. BOF could potentially provide £250 out of a total of £500. The deadline was felt to be far too short. JL had spoken to MDOC and SELOC who had put on a lot of low key local events without recruiting new members. Juniors would only become involved if their parents were keen and would provide transport. DM had spoken to Chris Burden of AIRE who said they almost had two separate clubs – members who would only come to

local events and members who competed more widely. NC suggested that if we found a useful project costing £500 the club could fund it on its own.

- **5. Treasurer's Report**: DM had circulated a report in advance. He felt that the recent legacy should be ring fenced for specific projects. All committee members are asked to come to the next meeting with wish lists for projects especially areas that need mapping. The £500 grant had come from the Post Code Lottery.
- 6. CompassSport Trophy: The club had performed extremely well but failed by 2 points to qualify for the final. DM reported that he had received all but one of the senior entry fees. He would send a reminder.

### 7. Fixtures:

**2019**: Race the Castles. There was still a lack of clarity about this series and unfortunately neither JL or DM had managed to log-in to the Sunday online forum. Members were worried about potentially wasting a new map if the event was poorly attended but DM suggested that if turn out was very low we could still use the area for a sprint in 2020. DM to investigate the potential costs of using the area.

**2020**: March 15<sup>th</sup> CompassSport heat. Provisionally Ogden. Anthony G had expressed concerns about parking and JL raised potential problems with Natural England. Still felt to be best area. JL to speak to APG. May 31<sup>st</sup>. YHOA Championships. Honley Old wood could be suitable if parking could be arranged. This would need to be on the fields above the wood but this could be OK in May. JP to investigate permissions. ??? would the area need to be remapped???. July 19<sup>th</sup> Urban league. Pontefract was suggested – would RP be willing to map? December 19/20. Night and day. Newmillerdam. Easy to organise and well liked.

**2021**: YHOA may be asked to host either British schools or British Schools Score. Thornes park?

- 8. BOC 2019: We have 3 teams entered for the Mixed Relays and 1 junior team for BRC. Roles are becoming clearer and EPOC will be issuing relay team bibs. From the previous weeks meeting it now appears that EPOC will not be using its SI boxes. Not clear re computers. Somehow DM got volunteered to handle relay registration. Hopefully will not need any help.
- 9. Informal Events: These seem to have been cancelled.
- **10.Controllers:** Jean and Jonathan still have some stages to complete before they are qualified.
- **11.AOB:** EH pointed out that those who attended the First Aid course organised by Viv were now well out of date. JL, DM and Juliet are well in date. DM said he felt that the 12 hour Outdoor Incident Management course (cost £100 plus) whilst necessary for coaches was overkill for first aid at the finish / event centre. Cost effective alternatives need to be investigated.

# Madeira 3 Days




At the Funchal City Race last December we picked up a flyer for the Madeira 3 days and over the Christmas period decided to go for a bit of winter sunshine. The local club is very laid back, enter and pay when you arrive – they laid on transport for us from Funchal, a nine seater people carrier and Steve & Julia Jarvis from Southdown Orienteers and ourselves were the only occupants. First day was up at Fanal in the mountains and the weather was diabolical – driving rain and visibility down to about 15 yards. Found No 1 (pile of rocks) on open heathland OK, but looking for 2 a re-entrant found myself at No 3, when I got to 2 decided to try going straight back to 3 – big mistake got tangled up in a load of brambles. The paths were now streams and major 180 degree error going to 4 saw me nearly run off the map. Couldn't find the fence adjacent to 5 so called it a day, whilst Judith bravely carried on and eventually got round the course.

Day 2 was to Santana then up a narrow hair-raising drive up to Queimadas – so hairy that Brendan Bolland from WAROC, who had hired a car, got vertigo so bad he never made it to the assembly. The courses were fairly short because after everyone had finished the whole set up had to be dismantled, packed up, driven across to Machico and re-assembled for the afternoon's urban race. I'd stuffed up my calf pretty badly going uphill to No 7 in the morning and the first few controls in the afternoon (especially the climb to No 4) knackered it completely and I shuffled round from then on.


Day 3 our driver took us up to the highest point on the island accessible by car, Pico do Areeiro 1808m unfortunately it was so misty there was no view. Last event was at Chao Feiteiras which was a rocky open area with steep impenetrable woods on three sides. I didn't start as my calf had stiffened up so much and Judith ran past control 13 but had looked at 14 on her control descriptions and didn't punch it, so mispunched but fortunately best 3 scores counted so overall she won W70.

At the finish everyday there was a choice of tea, isotonic drink, coca cola, nuts, biscuits, oranges, pears, apples, cake, energy bars and crisps. For a small club it's an amazing amount of hard work but I can recommend going if you fancy a great orienteering weekend.






Day 1





# **INTERLAND 2019**

Interland is an annual 5 cornered match between teams from France, The Netherlands, Belgium (Flemish), Belgium (French speaking) and England which this year took place in the setting of Saint Michel, Northern France. After being selected along with my mum, we both headed south on Friday night and the excitement was building.

The England Team were meeting at Beaconsfield for an early start on Saturday morning and at 6:30am we left and headed to pick up the rest of the team from multiple pick points on our way to Folkstone. Once everyone was on board we began to catch up and make friends. We arrived at the terminal, all went through passport control and then headed on the tunnel to Calais. When we arrived in France, we were greeted by the sun shining and the juniors had just about managed to wake up so spirits were lifting after such an early morning. We then were on our way and travelled to the training event via a stop in a little town where we were supplied with our kit and then carried on with our journey. Fortunately, the training was not too far or dissimilar from where the main competition was going to be held on Sunday.

This training event allowed us to get used to the mapping and the terrain of the foreign area and help us to understand further what we would have to face the next day. I had a clean run, I took it steady and let myself understand how to tackle the terrain and navigation as I had never

competed abroad before. Ironically, however, it was fairly similar to the terrain that I am used to in Yorkshire and the sun had held out so it was nice to get a run in and some fresh air after spending all day on the coach.

Once we were all finished up at the training event, we headed to the accommodation for the night and we all got told who we would be sharing rooms with. Fortunately, it was in age classes so I had Chloe, Lucy and Anne to accompany me for the night. We all headed straight for tea as soon as we had arrived and then had showers before getting organized for the next day. We then had a team meeting where the team manager, John, discussed with us any changes from the original details, a run through of the next day and the distances for the start and the plan after we had run. After that we all got ready for bed, ready to race the next day.



Waking up on Sunday morning was tough, it had been a long day before and I was in for another

long day ahead. Despite this we pulled ourselves out from bed, changed into our kit and headed to breakfast. Once we were all packed onto the coach, we set off for a 30 minute journey to the event. As the coach pulled up, Chloe and I sprang into action, got our kit on and headed to the start. Here we all started warming up, photo's were taken of each athlete running and then it was time to focus. As 9:40am was called up I took a step into the first box and took a deep breath. It felt like the longest minutes waiting and the adrenaline was pumping. However, I then had a shaky start after getting confused with the age classes layout and being unsure which descriptions and map to pick up. The start team made sure I was OK and then I was out and heading to number 1. I just knew I had to refocus, which luckily I did, and I settled down into my course. It was so nice to run through the forest although the streams/rivers did give me a fright when they were deeper and faster flowing than I had ever faced before, but I just gave it my all the whole way around as I also knew my fellow teammate Lucy was only 8 minutes behind me.



I had been having a good run and as I left control 13, I noticed I just had to cross a river and then I would be heading towards the finish with just a few controls to go. The river, however, had other ideas for me. I took a step into it and I felt confident I could cross it OK as I had seen 2 French

girls make it across before me, but it was fast flowing and deeper than I thought. I took another step further into the river and in the space of a few seconds I was swept off my feet and holding on to my map and a rock with all the strength that I had, however the panic began to hit me and I really began to struggle. Luckily one the girls that crossed before me helped me out but it was a shock to my legs and mind. I decided to take it steady to the rest of the controls but I had no idea how anyone else had done so I knew I needed to focus and make it to the end despite the wet and cold starting to hit my body. Once I had made it back and downloaded, I realized I was only 10 minutes behind Lucy and I was second counter for England as I had beaten Chloe by just over 10 minutes. I changed and warmed up before the prize giving began.

The anticipation for the results was nerve wracking, no one knew how England had done overall and after being previously beaten the past 2 times we really hoped we had done it. The results came in. I was pleased to be 6<sup>th</sup> out of 12 on my course and in the junior competition England narrowly missed first place by 1 point to one of the Belgian teams. Overall England came 1<sup>st</sup> by around a 30 point gap. We were over the moon, but with a train waiting for us in Calais we had a fairly prompt exit after inviting the other teams to come to England next year for Interland 2020. We all hustled onto the coach and we set off back.

During the journey the coach was fairly quiet, the tiredness had hit and we all just wanted to get to the terminal but we did get to share out the goody bags of biscuits and other treats the team had won at the prize giving! Once arriving at Calais, we all went through passport control, had a quick tea and then it was back on the coach to head onto the train. Once we had arrived back into Britain we drove off and headed back to Beaconsfield with some stops on the way. After we had arrived back at Beaconsfield mum and I jumped into the car and eventually, 3 hours later, arrived back home.

The experience of an international race was unforgettable and to be able to run for the team and gain the result I did topped off the weekend. Even though it wasn't the smoothest of rides when I was out on my race, I shocked myself at how much I had improved and what I was capable of. I made some amazing friends throughout the weekend and memories that will last a lifetime, and to finally earn my England kit made me feel so proud of everything I had achieved.



I would like to thank East Pennine Orienteering Club and Yorkshire and Humberside Orienteering Association for aiding me to be able to have this opportunity. I would also like to thank the England Orienteering Committee for giving me the opportunity to compete and to John, our Team Manager, who made sure we were organized for the weekend and ensured the athletes knew what was always going on.

# Portugese O Holiday 2019

Neil Croasdell, Judith and myself went to Portugal for a few days orienteering. We Flew to Lisbon then drove to Figueira da Foz for the POM2019.

It started with a relay around Figueira itself but if you didn't want to or couldn't run in a team it was possible to do a leg individually which is what we did. The event couldn't have been closer – it was outside our hotel door!

Storms and a forest fire last year meant that the area south of Figueira intended for the event was now ruled out so the first day was in Dunas da Tocha with the remaining 3 days in Quiaios using the same arena on each day but utilising different sections of forest. This was typical Portuguese Sand Dunes terrain, with pine forest and some very small open areas. Several small green areas/dots mostly caused by mimosas and some undergrowth vegetation areas.

On the Saturday night there was a night event in the adjoining village of Buarcos and we'd got almost the last starts, just before 9pm lots of little alleys and quite steep in places.

We moved on to Coimbra for a couple of days before driving over to Portalegre for the 2 day NAOM meeting. On arrival we went to the model event at Vale Lobo which was very runnable underfoot but with loads of boulders.

The first day was a middle distance event at Monte Melio (Crato) on an area similar to Brimham Rocks only much more extensive. Judith had a disaster here. In the start lanes the loose control descriptions were in a line rising in age up to W70 then an empty peg so she assumed that W70 was the oldest class. She took the descriptions then stood by the nearest map box (W70). Eventually she finished (and got one control wrong). As we were sat having a coffee I noticed she'd visited 4 extra controls and then I noticed she'd run W70/M80 course. We went back to the start and asked about W75 – apparantly they'd put the descriptions and map box furthest away in front of the W10s for some unknown reason.




In the evening there was a night event which started and finished inside the local municipal market with a ramp to run up and down to the finish.
